Students with autism from Sutherland House School are staging a drama show at the Djanogly Recital Hall, University Park, Nottingham on Wednesday 9th April. The event is being held to mark the 40th anniversary of NORSACA, the charity that runs Sutherland House School and offers help and support to people affected by autism from Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire and surrounding counties.

Pupils from the upper school will present 'Doctor Who and the Alien NORSACA' which will feature songs from the past four decades and a history of the charity. The lower school's show will include song and dance and a jungle adventure story.
